The first company she called quoted a low rate by phone for a half-truck, said they could "probably take the paint," and gave a two-hour window in between noon and 4 p.m.

We generated a crew that insisted on an on-site price quote. They measured approximately two-thirds of a truck once the lumber was cut and stacked. They flagged the paint and solvents as hazmat, estimated 12 gallons total, and used two alternatives: the house owner could drop the cans at the county event on Saturday morning totally free, or the company could manage hazmat transportation for a flat 120 dollars, which covered their cost and the facility intake. They also verified they would leave the freezer's refrigerant properly and offered the accreditation of their appliance recycler.

The difference in professionalism was clear. The property owner chose to spend for hazmat managing to save time, accepted the firm price, and arranged for 9 a.m. 2 team members arrived early, prepped doorframes with blankets, and had the garage clear by 10:45. They swept up sawdust, left the functional lumber aside for a

neighbor who asked to keep it, and offered contribution receipts for the bikes after providing them to a community repair program. The invoice matched the estimate. That is the basic to seek.

The ecological math of one truck
