1. Camouflage Sets

In a video game greatly concentrated on stealth, positioning, and forest hiding, skin option matters.

- **Woodland/Forest Camo:** Sets like the *Sylvan* or *Forest Raiders* series assistance gamers mix into tree zone and bushes.
- **Snow Camo:** Essential for tundra biomes. Using bright red in the snow makes a gamer a strolling bullseye, whereas white-themed skins provide essential concealment.

2. Night Advantages
