- **Coinflip:** A classic 1v1 video game where two gamers wager skins of roughly equal value. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes all (minus a small platform commission).
- **Crash:** A multiplier starts at 1.00 x and quickly climbs up. Players should cash out before the chart arbitrarily "crashes." If the crash occurs before a player cashes out, they lose their wager.
- **Roulette:** Similar to conventional casino live roulette, however normally adjusted with red, black, and green (or CT, T, and bomb) sections.

## The Regulatory Landscape and Controversy
