- **Prize:** Multiple players deposit skins into a central pot. A winner is drawn randomly; the greater the worth of the skins transferred, the higher the analytical chance of winning.
- **Esports Betting:** Traditional sportsbooks incorporated into gambling sites, permitting users to bet skins or cash on expert CS2 matches (ESL, BLAST, Major tournaments).

3. Steam Account Security and Scams

If a player logs into a deceptive site imitating a popular gambling platform, they run the risk of losing their whole stock to hackers. Moreover, Valve (the developer of CS) regularly punish gambling by banning API secrets and bot accounts, which can result in users losing access to funds stored on these platforms.

4. Financial Risk and Addiction

Since the currency is at first considered as "virtual pixels" instead of real money, players frequently fall under the trap of costs far more than meant. The digital nature of skins makes it emotionally much easier to put high-risk bets, possibly causing monetary distress.
