4. **The Crypto Pivot:** Following Valve's technical limitations, lots of CS: GO casinos rotated to accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) together with skins, operating in legal grey areas under offshore licenses (such as Curacao).
