Comparable to standard roulette, but usually with 3 colors (e.g., red, black, and green) representing various payments. High (Standard house edge) **Jackpot** Multiple gamers pool skins into a central pot. The higher the value of a gamer's deposit, the greater their analytical possibility to win the whole pool. High (Probability-based)

How CSGO Gambling Sites Operate: The Technical Side

Unlike standard online casinos that use fiat currency (GBP, EUR) or cryptocurrencies, CSGO gambling sites rely greatly on **API integration with Steam**.

When a user wants to deposit or withdraw funds, the procedure normally follows these steps:

1. **Authentication:** The user logs in via OpenID through their main Steam account.
2. **Inventory Sync:** The site's bot checks out the user's Steam stock to display their readily available CSGO skins.
