

Dagsboro is the kind of Delaware town that rewards slower looking. Drive through too quickly and it can seem like a modest inland community with quiet streets, familiar storefronts, and homes set back under old shade trees. Spend time there with a more careful eye, though, and the place opens up. The grain of its history shows up in its churches, civic buildings, weathered porches, fences that have carried more than one generation, and the mix of newer construction woven around older structures. That blend makes Dagsboro interesting in a practical way as well as an architectural one. It is a town where maintenance is never just maintenance, because every exterior surface participates in the larger story of preservation.

Historic preservation starts with understanding what not to do

One of the biggest mistakes I see in exterior maintenance is the belief that stronger pressure equals better results. That idea causes more damage than most people realize. High pressure can etch brick, scar soft wood, drive water behind siding, loosen mortar, and strip paint from surfaces that were already vulnerable. Once that happens, the repair bill often exceeds the cost of the original cleaning by a wide margin.

Preservation-oriented cleaning looks different. It begins with identifying the material, the condition of the substrate, and the type of growth or staining present. Mildew on vinyl does not need the same treatment as oxidation on painted aluminum, and neither calls for the same approach as dirt embedded in porous brick. In a historic setting, the goal is not to make a building look newly built. It is to remove damaging buildup while keeping the original material intact.

That approach takes patience. Sometimes the safest method is lower pressure paired with the right detergent and dwell time. Sometimes the job calls for a soft wash rather than a traditional high-pressure rinse. Sometimes the cleanest result comes from accepting a little discoloration in exchange for protecting delicate mortar or aging wood fibers. Choosing the right approach is more important than choosing the strongest one
