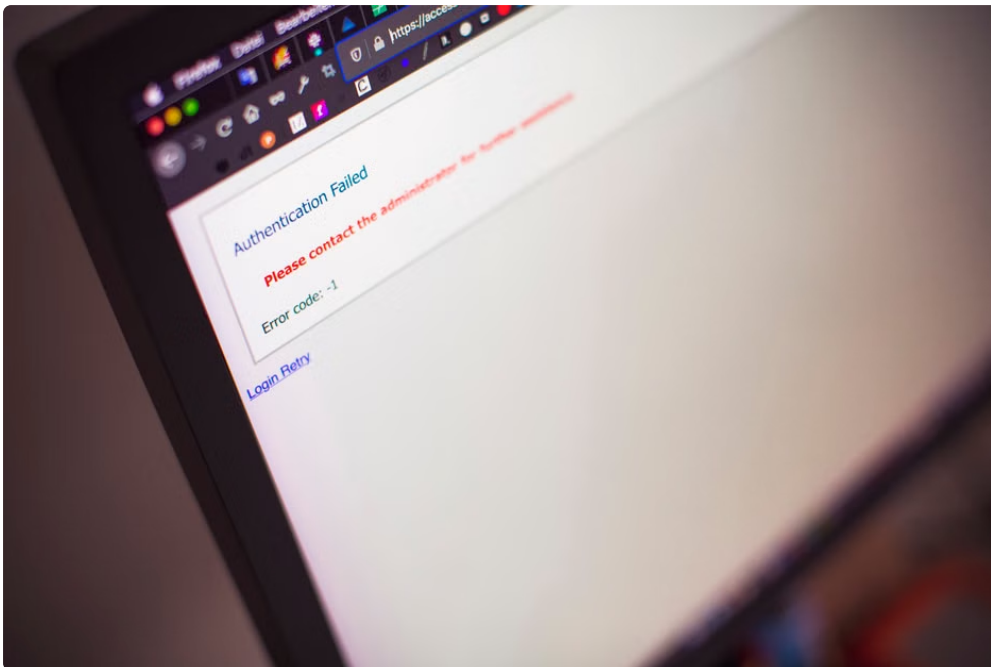

Using a checklist when navigating to the BingoPlus login screen helps you:

- Avoid fake or lookalike sites designed to steal passwords
- Distinguish between pages meant for logging in, app downloading, or recovering accounts
- Prevent accidental credential submissions on wrong or malicious pages
- Understand the navigation flow from brand search to account access

1. Understand Branded Login Intent vs Discovery Intent

What to check for branded login intent:

- The URL has a clear `"/login"` or similar path, like bingoplus.com/play/pwa/login/
- The page title or headline says "Login" or "Sign In"
- The page includes username/email and password fields—not registration forms or download buttons
- Links point back to the main BingoPlus domain, no external redirects

2. Guidance Page vs Authentication Screen: Know the Difference

Next, it's important to tell apart a **guidance page** (or instruction page) from the actual **authentication screen**. This point is often overlooked during navigation.

Guidance pages serve to help players with information on how to log in, how to download the app, or what to do if they forget credentials. However, these pages are not where you enter your login details. They may include:

- Step-by-step login instructions
- Links or buttons to get to the login screen
- Customer support or FAQ info

In contrast, the *authentication screen* is the one with the input fields requesting your username/email and password. This is the real login page.

Checklist tips:

- On a login page, you should see **input boxes for your credentials** immediately on screen
- A page offering tips or download links without input forms is just a guidance or landing page
- Use the trusted login URL: <https://bingoplus.com/play/pwa/login/> — this is BingoPlus’s official authentication URL as of now
- Always **read the hostname** carefully; it should end with `bingoplus.com` exactly

3. App Download Pages Are Not the Same as Login Screens

Many users confuse the app download page with the login page, especially when searching for BingoPlus on mobile devices. The download page looks very official and might have buttons to "Download For iOS" or "Download For Android," but this is not where you type your username or password.

Attempting to log in on a page that only lets you download the app won’t work — you need to complete the actual login process either within the app or on the official login screen on the website.

Remember:

- App download pages usually emphasize “Get the app,” have store badges, and lack credential fields
- They might guide new users to register or download to start playing
- If you want to access your existing account, you must navigate further to the authentication screen

Always double-check that you’re not stuck on an app download page before entering credentials.

4. Account Recovery Is a Separate Journey

Forgot your password or username? Account recovery is important, but it is a *separate* process from logging in. The BingoPlus login page typically offers a “Forgot password?” or “Recover account” link nearby, and clicking that navigates you to the recovery workflow.

5. Read Hostname, Watch For Misspellings, and Recheck After Redirect

- **Phishing pages** often use misspelled or tricky domain names to mimic BingoPlus.
