- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, often amusing or special look)

StatTrak™ Items

Any weapon unboxed has an approximately **10% chance** of being a StatTrak™ variant. These items include a small LED screen embedded on the weapon that tracks the number of validated eliminates made by the player utilizing that specific weapon. Generally, StatTrak™ weapons command a greater price on the marketplace, though exceptions exist for particular high-tier collector knives.
